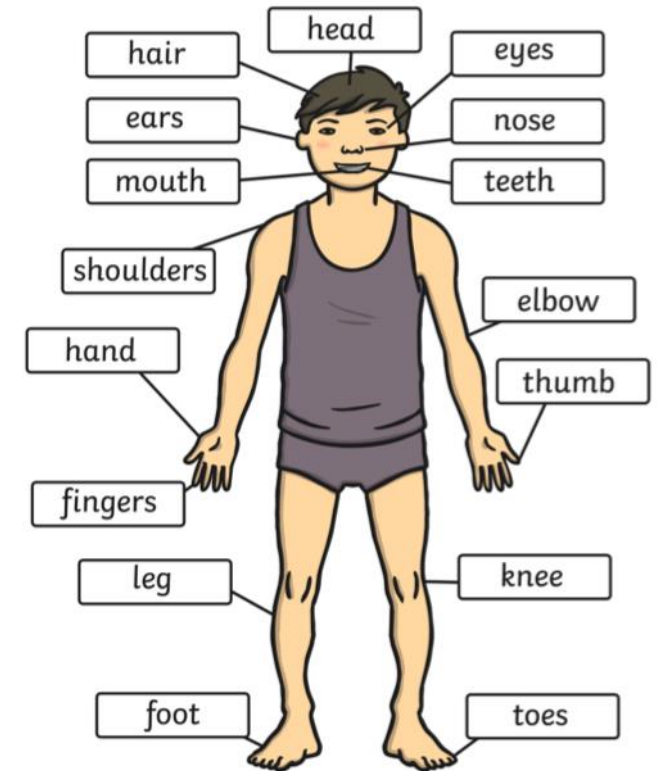


How are humans different to tigers?

Key Vocabulary - materials	
amphibian	Animals that spend their lives in the water and on land.
carnivore	An animal that eats meat.
chew	Grind food between the teeth.
grind	Crush into a powder.
herbivore	An animal that eats only plants.
incisors	Teeth used for biting food, at the front of your mouth.
mammal	Any animal of which the female feeds her babies on milk from her own body.
mane	Long hair on the neck of a horse or a lion.
molar	Teeth used for grinding, at the back of your mouth.
reptile	An animal that lays eggs and has scaly skin like a snake or a tortoise.
senses	Our five senses help us to understand what is happening around us.
tear	To pull apart into pieces.
tusk	A long pointed tooth made of ivory. Elephants and walruses have two tusks.

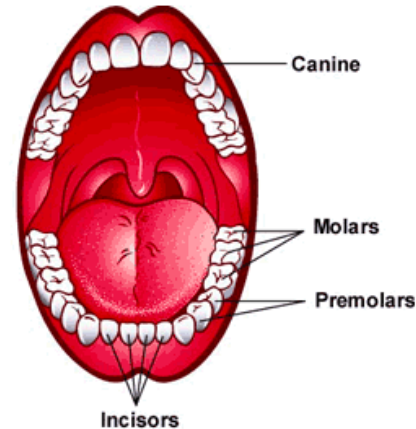
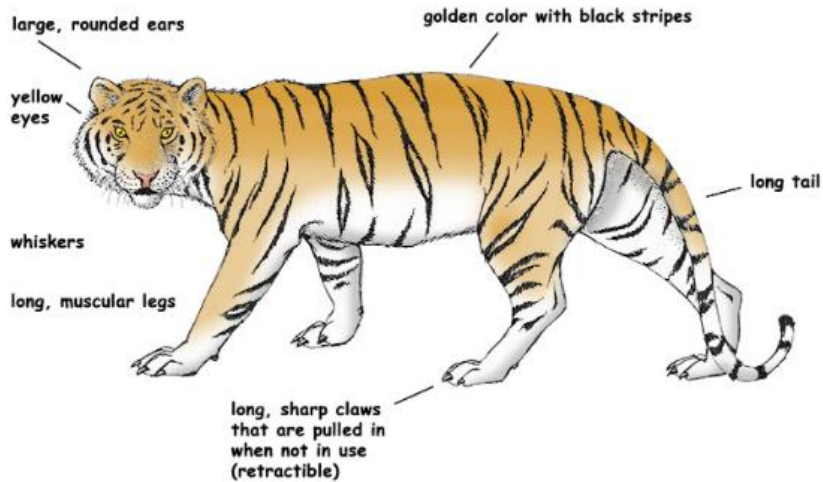

Carnivores

Carnivores are animals that only eat meat. They get this meat from other animals. They can have sharp teeth for chewing the meat or claws or beaks for ripping it.



Omnivores

Omnivores are animals that eat both **plants and meat**.



Herbivores

Herbivores are animals that **only eat plants**.

They can have **wide flat teeth** for grazing on grass or **beaks** to open nuts.
